

What Kind of Community?

In February, the elder board introduced a clarified vision statement to help define our target and measure our church's progress toward fullness in Christ.

The clarified vision of Grace: "We are seeking to become a community of generous lovers of God and others as wholehearted disciples of Jesus."

Over the next months we will be further explaining what we mean by these terms. In this article, I will expand on what we mean by the word community.

COMMUNITY – The experience of healthy, committed relationships built on

love, unity and mutual service, each using their gifts to support and build one another up.

If we were to choose one bible passage to support our definition of community, it would be Ephesians 4:1-6. There are two phrases in this passage that undergird the experience we hope to uphold at Grace.

"Bearing with one another in love..." (v.2). A blessing of community is that we are not alone. When we have worked so hard to overcome a challenge, it is the community to which we turn and lift our arms in celebration. When we are on our knees in weakness due to discouragement or suffering, it is the

suffering, it is the community that comes along side and consoles and comforts. They join us in our triumph and cry with us in our sorrow because they love us and have walked with us in our journey.

"Eager to maintain the unity of the

Spirit..." (v.3). Our unity is reflected in the reality that there is "one body and one Spirit—just as we were called to the one hope that belongs to our call—one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all" (v.4-6). As such, we are eager to maintain

community though we are a diverse, multifaceted group of people.

Our eagerness is displayed in our honoring of one another in our differences, personalities and life experiences. We are patient with one another when we act out of our fear and woundedness and say hurtful things. We confess our fears and failures and repent when we wrong one another. In gentleness and humility, we forgive one another and are willing to do the hard work of moving toward reconciliation.

As a healthy community, we willingly sacrifice our own desires and needs at times in deference to one another and their needs. We use our own resources to build one another up until we all reach fullness in Christ.

66 And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another and all the more as you see the Day approaching. **HEBREWS 10:24-25**

Only One Life

The year was 1942, and a young woman—just a girl at the time— walked the same hallway every day on her way to class. There, painted on the wall in simple letters, was a phrase she barely noticed at first:

"Only one life, and it'll soon be passed."

At the time, she didn't think much of it. After all, life stretched out before her like an endless road. Summers felt never ending, and the idea of life passing quickly seemed like something really far-fetched. But time, as we all know, has a way of proving otherwise.

Now in her 80s, she told me her story, and it's never left me.

"I thought I had all the time in the world," she said. "But life is short. Very short. And it passes so quickly. What you do, you have written—you can't change it."

She paused; her eyes filled with tears at the weight of the years she had lived. Clearly, she had made many mistakes when she was younger. She was trying to hide her disappointment, but I could see it behind her eyes.

"What seemed like endless time when I was younger is now behind me. And I've learned that we really do have only one life to live. It's one chance, one shot to make it count. There's no going back, no second chances to do it all over again."

"I used to think I'd have time to do my own thing first, and then later, I'd do God's will if I wanted," she admitted. "I thought if I followed Him, I might miss out on something. I didn't want to have Him in my life. But you know what? I found out that the will of God is what makes you happy. It's not something that takes away from you—it's what gives you purpose. He is so gracious. He has a plan for everyone—one chance, one life. If you follow Him, He'll guide you, protect you, and bless you."

At this point I was captivated. I wanted to hear more how this woman had experienced God. What exactly in her life changed to make her want to follow Jesus?

"People say, 'You can't take it with you.' But that's simply not true," she said, her voice steady and sure. "In the book of Revelation, it says, 'Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord... their deeds will follow them.' What you do for Christ, that's what lasts. That's what you take with you. Our deeds do indeed live on."

She spoke about her children, her grandchildren, and memories of what really mattered to her. She had stories of past experiences where she felt the hand of God. It was inspiring. Then she concluded with this statement:

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"It's not about what you own. It's about what you leave behind—the love you gave, the faith you lived. I don't want to leave behind just memories. I want to leave behind something eternal, something that follows me."

I asked her what she would say to someone who still thought they had all the time in the world.

She didn't hesitate.

"Don't wait. I've seen too many people who thought they had more time, but time ran out. They had plans, dreams, things they were 'going to do someday'—but someday never came. Life goes by fast. And in the end, only what's done for Christ will last."

"When you stand before God, it won't matter how much money you made, how many people knew your name, or what kind of house you lived in. The only thing that will matter is what you did for Him. And I promise you, nothing else will compare."

I finished my tea and thanked her for her time, but as I walked away, her words stayed with me. They echoed in my mind like that phrase on the wall she had seen so many years ago—only one life, and it'll soon be passed.

I couldn't shake the weight of it. How often do we assume we have more time? More

chances? More "somedays" to get things right? But life isn't a rehearsal. We don't get a second draft.

As I stepped outside, the cool air hit my face, and I found myself whispering a quiet prayer: "Lord, let me live for what truly lasts, help me and my family and friends live deeply in Your will. I love You Lord, thank you."

During one of the most challenging periods of our ministry, we felt God's call to persevere and continue serving the Stockton community. Here's how His vision unfolded:

- 1. God placed a renewed calling on our hearts to remain in ministry in Stockton.
- 2. He inspired the name "Love Them All Resource Center" (LTA Resource Center) for this mission.
- 3. The nonprofit status for LTA, which we expected to take over a year, was granted in just three months.
- 4. We prayed for a facility, and God provided an affordable space with utilities included, enabling us to pay one year's rent upfront with the funds already in hand.
- 5. One of our supporters, Thrivent Financial stepped forward to sponsor a fundraising dinner, helping us build a financial foundation for the ministry.
- 6. Initially, we anticipated that Bob would work his second job for another six months to a year, but in December 2024, our Board of Directors confirmed LTA could now support his full-time salary. He resigned from his second job, effective January 31, 2025, to dedicate himself fully to LTA.
- 7. Throughout this journey, we have remained steadfast in their commitment to serving local schools, children, and families, as they have for over 30 years.

We are amazed at how God has worked through every step to make this vision a reality!

CAPTURE THE MOMENT! WHY?

Have you thought about what a wonderful time this is? I know, you've got to be kidding? During these trying times, take inventory of your walk. What can you do to come out of this a stronger person for HIM?

Isn't it a wonderful thing to know that no matter what, we're in! We are HIS! OK, OK I get it but I've come to realize that I need to improve my prayer life and especially compassion. I've been reading and re-reading James these past few weeks and what really caught my attention was Charles Stanley's comments on James 5: 15 & 16: And the prayer of faith will save the sick and the Lord will raise him up. And if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven. Confess your trespasses to one another, and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The effective prayer of a righteous man avails much. Dr. Stanley hits on 6 points, 2 of which, I would like to expand on:

#1 Our prayers must flow from a heart filled with love, compassion and forgiveness

Our prayers fail if we have bitterness or anger. We need the love and compassion that Jesus had/has. Have you prayed about someone that you really resented? In hopes that God might grab him or her by the neck and pound some sense into them? Pretty dramatic huh? Stick with me. So, what's the answer when we have this resentment? It's found on our knees or flat on your back with outstretched arms appealing to God for His help to overcome your anger. You can't wing it or overcome these negative thoughts with out divine intervention. You've heard this one a million times but it's factual 'Let go and let God'. Let Him have it. Surrender.

Then there's compassion. Oh brother! Yep! You gotta 'walk in their moccasins'. I've never had a double mastectomy so how can I relate? It's getting away from ourselves and really listening to the other person with sincerity. I mean, don't try to patronize the other person.

Get real! Drain yourself of 'me, myself & I' thoughts. Sit with that person and really listen to him or her as if Jesus was sitting with you and then wanting you to give Him a report of the agony and grief that the other person is experiencing. Read that again – pretty humbling isn't it?

To be honest with you, it took me about 30 years to forgive a person in our family for what they did. I really don't have a remedy for this one other than the fact – again – that you can't do it alone and it will never happen without His help. He's the One you'll have to sit with and cry out to. Dump it on Him. It does help to have a close brother or sister to share your anger about another person and that person can help through prayer for you and with you. Don't go it alone.

#2 We must recognize that our prayers are the link between another person's need and God's inexhaustible resources.

Stanley goes on to say "Ask the Lord to reveal to you the true needs of a person, not just the superficial or symptomatic needs". This might take some intervention on your part to really get to the heart of the matter. For instance, what was their childhood like? What challenges to they face right now? What 'thorn in their side' are they carrying? I think you get my point.

Have you ever thought about being a link between that person and God? Heavy! We could throw scripture all day at that person (which they most likely already know) OR we can reach up to Him and reach out to them simultaneously. As for me, I can't do one without the other.

Soooo, what can you do to improve your relationship with Jesus and others?
